1990 California QSO Party
Sponsored by the Northern California Contest Club

BEGINS: 1600 UTC October 6, 1990 ENDS: 2200 UTC October 7, 1990

Single operator entries may operate only 24 hours; off times must be clearly marked in the log and must be at least 15 minutes long.
Multi operator entries may operate the full 30 hours.
Stations may be worked once on CW and Phone on each band.
All contacts must be simplex; no MCW.
Single-op and multi-single entries are allowed only one transmitted signal.
All CW contacts must be made in the CW sub-band, except for 160 meters.
California stations that change counties are considered to be new stations and may be contacted again for point and multiplier credit. CA stations operating from a county line may be counted only as one QSO.

OBJECT: Stations outside of California work as many California stations in as many CA counties as possible; stations in California work anyone.

EXCHANGE: California stations send QSO number and county; stations outside of California send QSO number and state/province/country.

QSO POINTS: Each complete phone contact is worth 2 QSO points. Each complete CW contact is worth 3 QSO points.

MULTIPLIERS: California stations use states and VO/VE1-7 and VY1/VE8 for a possible total of 58. Out-of-state stations use the number of different California counties for a possible total of 58. CA stations on a county line may be claimed as a multiplier for any or all of the counties they give in their exchange.

TOTAL SCORE: The total score is the number of QSO points multiplied by the total number of multipliers.

FREQUENCIES: 160 through 2 Meters excluding all WARC bands. CW on 1805 and 40 KHz up from the band edge. Phone on 1815, 3850, 7230, 14250, 21300, and 28450. Novices 10 KHz up from the band edge and 28450.
Try CW on the half hour.
Try 147.54 MHz at 2000, 0000, and 0400Z.
Try 160 meters at 0500Z; 80/75 meters at 0300 and 0700Z.

DEADLINE FOR SCORE SUBMISSION: All logs and summary sheets must be sent to NCCC c/o Jim Duffy, WA6AUE, POB 8820, Truckee, CA 95737, by November 15, 1990. Please include a business size SASE for results. Entries of more than 200 QSOs must include duplicate sheets.
For a CQP paperwork packet containing log and summary sheets, county abbreviations, and contest records, send a business size SASE to the above address.

N6ADI retires as editor!

After seven (7) years of doing the bulletin for the SCCC, Ski, N6ADI is passing the baton on to Mark, WA6OTU, who has expressed an interest in taking it over for about a year. Since taking on the bulletin in 1984 from NE6I, Dennis, Ski has experimented in various formats and has finally got the tools and software down to a science. Using Ventura publisher, a Laserjet Series II printer over the past several years has taught Ski a bundle about desk top publishing and the powers of the computer. Ski has not been as active recently on the air waves due to work, VW re-building/restoring and a change in priorities. You will find him on CW a couple times a week but the contesting has been put on the back burner for the time being. I think we all go through periods of contesting and ham radio excitement. Ski has in the past tried his utmost to excite the club and it's members about various activities and ventures through his terms as secretary/treasurer/bulletin editor; sometimes with success. Often, Ski has been frustrated by lack of club functions and activities, but has learned that different people have different priorities and that the SCCC, being spread out over such a wide geographical area has problems in getting a lot of people together to do something. He has learned a lot about clubs and people and it has benefited him in other endeavors. When he took on the bulletin the membership was between 25 and 30 members and since taking on the bulletin the membership has averaged around 90 members for the past 5 years. This accomplishment is attributed to Ski's often controversial editorializing and a regular bulletin, that was always on the street 6 times a year. The bulletin represents approximately 24-40 hours of time every two months in its current format and over the past 7 years the paper, staples, and xeroxing has been covered (camshaved) by Ski. So look for a new look and new editor in January 1991. Ski's last issue will be the November/December bulletin, look for something special! Best of luck to Mark, WA6OTU!
